

## Who we are:



The AFGE Young Organizing Unionists for the Next Generation (Y.O.U.N.G.) program seeks to mobilize young union members to become leaders and activists for social change within AFGE and the Labor Movement. AFGE members who are under the age of 40 and those mentors that are over 40 will work together to include younger workers into the union structure and keep them engaged in what's at stake for working class Americans.

AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. intends to provide young members with networking opportunities and resources to engage in mobilizing other young workers into AFGE, union training to promote leadership skills, innovative social gatherings, AFGE conference meetings, and other engaging events. In doing so, AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. participants work to build lasting labor solidarity, advance issues of social and economic justice, and find more inclusive ways to engage the current and future generations in the Labor Movemen

#### **GOALS OF THE AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. PROGRAM**

- Create tools to organize and mobilize young AFGE members and encourage non-members to join AFGE.
- Encourage mentors over the age of 40 to join the AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. Program to educate and prepare young members for leadership roles.
- Encourage Local & District leadership to select a Y.O.U.N.G. Representative.
- Educate members on the importance of AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. and the young workers movement as a whole.
- Include a AFGE Y.O.U.N.G. meeting/training or social event at major AFGE conferences.



## Our Origins:

AFGE held a meeting of members under the age of 40 at the 2009 Convention. As a result of this meeting, there were four key findings of how to recruit younger members:

#1: AFGE members play a key role in introducing future young members to AFGE.

#2: Face-to-face recruitment programs are the most effective way to recruit young members.

#3: Individual discounts and member benefits are the most effective incentives for recruiting young members

#4: Although the general membership mailing is the most commonly used tool for communicating with young professionals, AFGE must expand its efforts to include more segmented communications as well.

At the 2012 convention, the first Y.O.U.N.G. AFGE Training Summit was held and a resolution was passed to support the formation of Y.O.U.N.G. AFGE Committees.

#### This resolution specifically asked for:

- The formation of a National Y.O.U.N.G. AFGE Committee comprised of a Y.O.U.N.G. representative from each District; and
- Locals to form Local Y.O.U.N.G. AFGE Committees comprised of a Y.O.U.N.G. representative from their membership.

Since 2012, the Y.O.U.N.G. AFGE program continues to gain momentum at all levels of AFGE and the labor movement.

Young unionists are stepping up in their Locals, Councils, and districts to take action and mobilize their peers. At the same time, union leaders and mentors are providing opportunities for young workers to contribute their skills and talent to their unions and communities.
